

Population:

The hub of development but neglected in Nigeria

---Ignorance



Introduction (Cont.)

- ▶ "Today, Nigeria stands out as the only major country in the world whose population size is not known with any degree of certainty....Every attempt at conducting a national census that both meets international standards and is acceptable to all Nigerians has failed"
- Between 1921 and 2006, no reliable information about Nigeria population
- ► Makinwa-Adebusoye, 2014: 1

Introduction (Cont.)

Government attitude

- Until 1988, population management was NOT given serious attention
- ► Laisser-faire approach

Nature of population policy:1988, 2004

- ▶ Laisser-faire remains the word
- Voluntary
- Quite inconsequential

Demographic Situation in Nigeria

► Traditional Indicators

- ---Birth (Fertility)
- National TFR = 5.5
- ▶ Urban = 4.7
- ► Rural = 6.2
- NPC & Macro Int., 2014

Demographic Situation in Nigeria (Cont.)

- ----Death (Mortality)
- ▶ Infant Mortality Rate (under 5 years death) = 128 per 1000 live births (2009 2013)
- ► Maternal Mortality Ratio= 500 652 per 100,000 live births (2006 2013)
 - ▶ NPC & Macro Int., 2014
- Adult Mortality = 13 per 1000 (Ghana = 9 per 1000)
- ▶ Life Expectancy = 52 (National); Male = 51 & Female = 52 (Ghana 61years)
 - ▶*PRB*, 2013

Demographic Situation in Nigeria (Cont.)

---Movement (Migration)

- Internal (rural-urban quite rapid, especially towards Kano, Lagos, Port Harcourt, Abuja, etc.)
- International


Demographic Situation in Nigeria(Cont.)

Rate of Natural Increase

- ► High birth rate and low death rate lead to high rate of natural increase = 3.1 % (Brazil = 0.9 % & China = 0.5%)—2013
- ▶ Doubling Time = 23.5 years (Population of Nigeria currently over 170m by 2038 = 340m)
- ▶ Modern contraception among married women remain as low as 10%
- PRB, 2013; NPC & Macro Int., 2014

Youthful Population (Over 45% under 15 Years old). Rapid Population Growth





Consistency Will Lead to:




Negative Consequences
